If you believe you've found a security vulnerability in PayZen's service, please notify us; we will work with you to resolve the issue promptly.

Disclosure Policy

- If you believe you've discovered a potential vulnerability, please let us know by emailing us at vulnerability@payzen.com. We will acknowledge your email within five business days.
- Provide us with a reasonable amount of time to resolve the issue before disclosing it to the public or a third party. We aim to resolve critical issues within ten business days of disclosure.
- Make a good faith effort to avoid violating privacy, destroying data, or interrupting or degrading the PayZen service. Please only interact with accounts you own or for which you have explicit permission from the account holder.

Exclusions

While researching, we'd like you to refrain from:

- · Distributed Denial of Service (DDoS)
- Spamming
- · Social engineering or phishing of PayZen employees or contractors
- · Any attacks against PayZen's physical property or data centers
